WHY AMBOSELI

Welcome to Amboseli, the land of “pachyderm selfies” and awe-inspiring natural wonders! Situated in the south of Kenya, Amboseli National Park is where wildlife takes center stage and Mount Kilimanjaro photobombs your safari pictures (yes, that’s right, Africa’s tallest peak loves a good cameo).

Amboseli means the place of salty dust in the Maasai language, probably because the volcanic ash spill from Kilimanjaro created the dust terrain seen in the park.

Amboseli National Park has a range of landscapes, from the savannas and hills to wetlands, sulphur springs, open forests and even a pre-historic lake bed. It has one of the highest concentrations of elephants in Kenya and the region is the traditional homeland of the Maasai people.




GETTING TO AMBOSELI

By road, it is a 4-5 hour drive on the Nairobi - Mombasa highway from Nairobi. It's a straightdrive until you reach the Emali town turn which leads you to the Iremito park gate.

By air, the journey is under an hour from Nairobi, and flights land at Amboseli Airport inside the park. Safarilink operates scheduled short-haul flights into Amboseli.



THINGS TO DO IN AMBOSELI

GAME DRIVES



Amboseli is known as the “home of the African Elephant”, making it one of the best places to view these giants up close. While on a game drive, you can explore the ever-present marshlands that form their own wildlife ecosystem. A game drive in Amboseli will take you through four different habitats: from the bed of Lake Amboseli to wetlands with sulphur springs, the savannah and woodlands. After the extended rains, the normally dry Lake Amboseli fills up with water and attracts lots of birdlife. All the park roads are murrum so a vehicle suitable for off-road driving is recommended.

SUNDOWNERS

Observation Hill of Amboseli is a marvellous place for sundowners or a picnic breakfast. It is one of the only places in the park where you can step out of your vehicle. After a short hike to the top of the hill, you’ll have a bird’s eye-view over plains, marshes and wildlife. Here you get clear sightings of Mt Kilimanjaro (when not covered in clouds) and amazing sunsets. Various safari camps also have their secret spots for sunset viewing over cocktails.



CULTURAL VISITS




Get some cultural immersion with a visit to a neighbouring Maasai manyatta (homestead). The Maasai are arguably Kenya’s most famous tribe and are local to Amboseli and the neighbouring region. Recognizing that a national park could never be large enough to protect the migratory herds without displacing the Maasai, who have conserved wildlife down the ages, Amboseli was the first park to enlist communities in conservation. The Maasai communities were given a portion of the park revenues to support wildlife on their lands and encourage them to set up their own wildlife sanctuaries and tourist lodges.

CONSERVATION WORK

Given Amboseli's high density of elephants, a lot of work is done to ensure their populations are protected. The Amboseli Trust for Elephants is one of the largest programmes along with Save the Elephants. You can donate to both organizations to help fund their work, and with the Amboseli Trust for Elephants, you can even choose a family to follow and get regular insights into their stories and little daily dramas.

Another famous organization based in Amboseli is the Maasai Wilderness Conservation Trust (MWCT). You might have heard Edward Norton speak about them (yes, the American actor is President of the Fund). MWCT focus their work on the land between Tsavo and Amboseli national parks. The Maasai communities of this area own all of the land and within it lie critical wildlife migration corridors and habitat reserves, forests that are carbon sinks and rivers and springs that supply the fresh water not only to this ecosystem but to more than seven million people in Kenya.

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
GOOD TO KNOW

Weather:

The climate in Amboseli is generally warm and dry in the daytime hours and cooler at night. Average temperatures range between 20°C – 28°C. The rainy seasons are from mid-March to June, and November to December.

Best Time to Go:

Amboseli National Park is open year-round. The best times to visit the park are in between the rains which are also the most favourable times for viewing wildlife. This would be from December to March and July to October.

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


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
